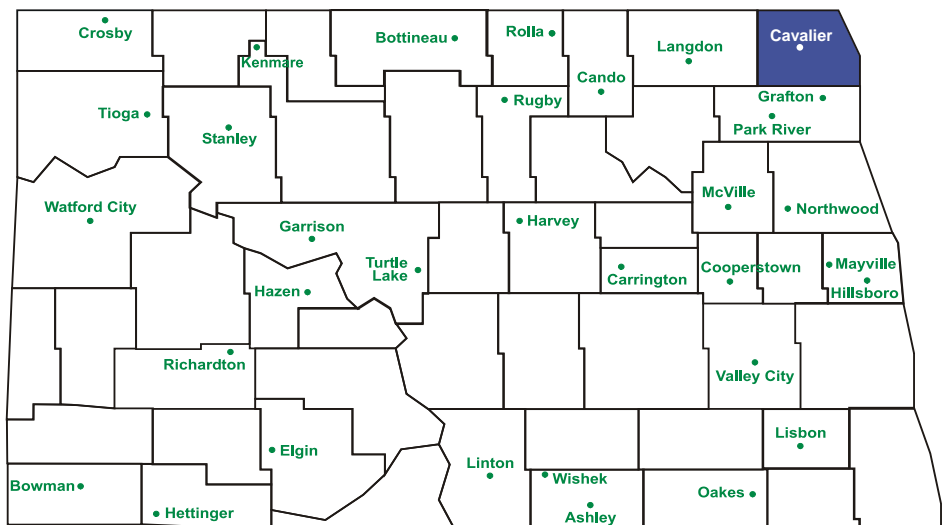

History:

The history of Pembina County Memorial Hospital dates back to the Summer of 1945 when a group of area residents met to discuss the ways they might honor the veterans of World Wars I and II. The suffering, the devastation, and the loss of untold numbers of human lives—all products of armed conflicts—was still fresh on the minds of many; therefore, it was only natural and fitting that the group settled on building a “living” memorial. That memorial would be in the form of a county hospital. It would be a place of healing, a perfect tribute to the veterans of World Wars I and II. A planning committee, including representatives from each of the county’s townships, was formed and the project was set in motion. Given its central location, Cavalier was selected as the site of the facility, and in 1952, ground breaking took place. In 1953 Pembina County Memorial Hospital opened its doors to the public.

Recreation:

Residents of Cavalier live in the state’s oldest county, Pembina. School enrollment K-12 totals about 725. School administrators and teachers are proud that Cavalier students in grades 3-6 typically score in the 60th to 70th percentiles on comprehensive basic skills exams, and students in grades 7-12, in the 70th to 80th percentiles. Dropout rate is nearly nonexistent. Recreational facilities include a swimming pool, tennis courts, bowling alley, two parks, auto racetrack, movie theater, skating rink and golf course. The nearest major shopping center is in Grand Forks, ND, 80 miles south, or in Winnipeg, Manitoba, 90 miles north.
