First Things First: Expanding Broadband Access

- **Broadband Access**
 - Referred to as a “super-determinant” of health
- **Broadband Deserts**
 - 34 million people lack broadband access, including 23 million Americans in rural areas



Telehealth Examples

- **Video Directly Observed Therapy** – Tuberculosis Medication Monitoring
- **Family Home Visiting** – Online Parent Support Services
- **Substance Abuse Treatment** – Telehealth Tools to Address the Opioid Crisis



Telehealth Examples (Cont.)

- **Telemental Health** – Virtual Counseling
- **Community Paramedicine** – Connecting Patients in their Homes with Caregivers Elsewhere
- **Project ECHO** – “Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes”



Case Study: Telehealth as a Tool in TB Elimination

- **Treatment and containment of active tuberculosis (TB) remains a serious national public health concern.**
- **In 2017, a total of 9,093 TB cases were reported in the United States.**
- **Increasing efforts to detect and treat latent TB infection is critical to resuming progress toward TB elimination. Telehealth could be a useful tool in a robust TB control program.**

Directly Observed Therapy (DOT)

- Global standard of care.
- Method in which a health care worker or other designated individual watches the patient swallow every dose of the prescribed medication.
- Helps patients adhere to their treatment regimens.
- Challenges: Time-consuming; costly; especially difficult to deliver in rural communities



Video Directly Observed Therapy (VDOT)

- Health care workers observe patients taking prescribed medication remotely via a webcam or smartphone
- Promise for cost savings
- Patients and providers have reported satisfaction with use of the technology

Privacy & Security

HIPAA and State Data Practices Statutes

- **Duty to keep information regarding patients' treatments confidential and to safeguard a patient's medical records.**
- **Business Associate Agreements with telehealth software provider.**



Reimbursement

Legal Developments

- Forty-nine states and D.C. have some form of telehealth coverage in their Medicaid programs.
- Thirty-eight states and D.C. have laws governing private payer reimbursement for telehealth.

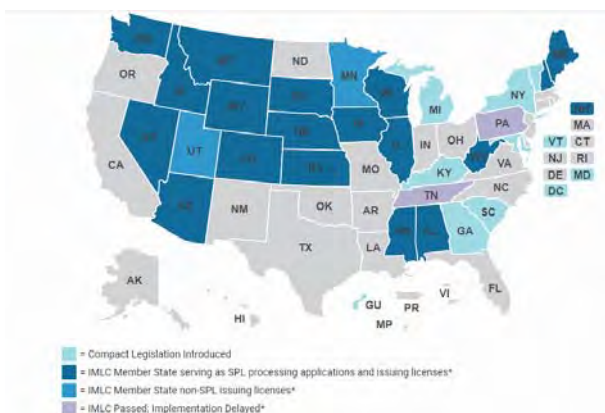
Challenges Remain

- Local health department billing capacity.
- Administrative clarifications are still needed to ensure reimbursement for particular services.
- Medicare reimbursement policy lags behind.

Interstate Medical Licensure Compact

- Voluntary expedited pathway to licensure for qualified physicians who wish to practice in multiple states

Other Legal Issues

Informed Consent

- Some states have telehealth-specific statutory requirements relating to consent.

Medical Malpractice

- Regulations vary by state; Providers practicing medicine across state lines must ensure that their malpractice liability insurance policy extends coverage to multiple states.



Prescribing

- Some states require that an in-person physical examination occur prior to writing a prescription.



Telehealth Best Practices

1. **Assess organizational readiness for telehealth.**
2. **Seek stakeholder support and engagement; focus on patient experience.**
3. **Adopt patient inclusion/exclusion criteria from the outset and a plan for modification, if needed.**
4. **Implement appropriate administrative, physical, and technical safeguards to protect patient information.**
5. **Involve your technical leadership and legal counsel in program planning.**
6. **Keep abreast of current laws and regulations that may impact your telehealth program.**

Telehealth Best Practices

7. Build back-up systems into your telehealth program in case of technical failure.
8. View grants as “seed funding” and actively seek long-term sustainability from the outset.
9. Establish short and long-term performance goals.
10. Evaluate the strengths/weaknesses of your program on a regular basis and share your lessons learned and successes!
