Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual (LGB) youth in North Dakota attempt snieide at a rate 58 times higher than the estimated national average for micide attempts. Nearly half of North Dakota's LGB youth experienced bullying for their identity. Eight percent of all youth in our state reported being bullied because other students thought they were gay.

Suicide Prevention Plan 2017-2020

Action Step 4.g: Dakota OutRight, a North Dakota LGBTQ+ Service Advocacy organization, will appoint a liaison to participate in NDSPC meetings, planning and other activities by January 2017 and on an ongoing basis.

Action Step 4.b: Dakota Outright will perform a cultural competency audit of all NDSPC and NDDoH Suicide Prevention materials by September 2017.

Action Step 4.c: The NDSPC will work with an LGBTQ+ Liaison to create culturally competent LGBTQ+ materials by March 2018.

Action Step 4.d: The NDSPC and the NDDoH will coordinate and support a three-tiered competency training for crisis workers as well as to emergency response professionals providing suicide prevention interventions state-wide. The first tier will be completed by September 2017.


Action Step 4.e: The NDSPC will support the inclusion of culturally competent questions regarding gender identity and sexual orientation within surveys and other study models to inform North Dakota's future targeted LGBTQ+ prevention interventions.

Outcome Measure II.B.4 (LGBTQ+). By 2020, 75 percent of crisis workers providing telephone suicide crisis counseling will complete a cultural sensitivity training which meets the standards of North Dakota's LGBTQ+ Service Advocacy organization, Dakota OutRight. One hundred percent of all NDSPC materials will be culturally sensitive as determined by Dakota OutRight. (2017 baseline is zero.)






Total Population Percentage




Total Suicide Attempt Precentage







North Dakota Violent Death Reporting System Suicide Data





CHILDREN & ADOLESCENTS (AGED 0-18)

Of the circumstances listed in the figure, 50% had multiple contributing circumstances. Nearly 36% either had a current mental health diagnosis or were reportedly in a depressed mood leading up to their death. Approximately 30% were ever treated for mental health or substance abuse problems. Around 4% had contact with a health care system within 2 weeks of their death.

- 2. Communicate with highly biased and prejudiced language about LGBTQ+ individuals
- 3. Child internalizes negative messages and loses trust/safety with parent.

How Safe is School?

- 1. Youth are likely to experience bullying
- 2. Become afraid of school leading to truancy, may not be able to tell people
- 3. May be outed by school regardless
- 4. May use substances to cope, may be kicked out of school or arrested

How Safe is Our State?

- 1. Many caseworkers don't believe LGBTQ+ Identity matters and very few systems account for it
- 2. Three larger School Districts refused to take the YRBS because it included LGBTQ+ questions
- 3. Almost no suicide prevention efforts target the discrepancies that exists for LGBTQ+ youth.
- 4. Even youth in identifibly unsafe homes, aren't necessarily served by the foster system. High risk of running away and trafficking.



CURRENT EFFORT

- Every major medical association supports gender affirming care, with APA releasing a new, very strong public statement in favor.(1)
- ND as a state has never addressed LGBTQ+ suicidality, but has taken efforts to increase risk factors
- Old and New organizations are starting to recognize the serious problems impacting our LGBTQ+ Youth, with major grants being awarded to address outcomes

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ND HOPES

- ND HOPES is a suicide prevention project spanning a 21-county jurisdiction in western North Dakota.
- Funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), ND HOPES takes a comprehensive approach to suicide prevention among rural populations, veterans and LGBTQIA+ youth.
- Currently utilizing upstream prevention through Sources of Strength among other avenues

FirstLink

- Call Center for 988 Suicide Crisis Line and the 211 help line for North Dakota
- Recieved nearly 2 million dollars in funding from 2023 session to expand
- 988 now specializes with options for LGBTQ+ Youth by dialing 988 and pressing 3 on menu
- 95% of calls end without first responders called

Raven's Mom

- The first and only suicide bereavement group for survivors of LGBTQ+ Suicides
- Offers support groups for both parents and youth, serving the state through virtual services and local community of Minot

North Dakota Chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention

- The AFSP has stood firm in preventing LGBTQ+ related suicides, sponsoring the only ever conference in our state with that focus in 2019
- The Out of the Darkness Walk
 Fundraising event raised hundreds of thousands of dollars and included rainbow beads to acknowledge and honor LGBTQ+ individuals lost to suicide

School Health HUB

An interdisciplinary partnership between College of Education and Human Development, Counseling Psychology and Community Service Program Area, Public Health, Early Childhood Education, and Fargo Public Schools to provide accessible school-based behavioral health, public health, and additional early childhood education programs.
