R-COOL-Health Scrubs Programs

The Center for Rural Health offers three Scrubs programs: the R-COOL-Health Scrubs Academy I, R-COOL-Health Scrubs Academy II, and the R-COOL-Health Scrubs Camps.

The R-COOL-Health Scrubs programs are opportunities for North Dakota students to learn about careers in healthcare from healthcare professionals in fun, interactive ways. The Scrubs programs aim to increase awareness about multidisciplinary health careers and encourage students to pursue careers in healthcare.

The R-COOL-Health Scrubs
Academy I is a four-day/three-night
camp held on the University of North
Dakota campus and is open to any North
Dakota junior high student who has
completed grade 6, 7, or 8.

The R-COOL-Health Scrubs
Academy II is a four-day/three-night
camp based out of Minot and is open to
any North Dakota high school student
who has completed grade 9, 10, or 11.

The R-COOL-Health Scrubs Camps are one-day camps in rural communities. It involves a partnership that includes, at minimum, a local healthcare facility, economic or job development authority, and schoolwork to create a one-day camp for students to learn about careers in healthcare from local healthcare professionals.
